"Teacher of record" defined

"Teacher of record" refers to the single special education teacher to whom a student with a disability is assigned. Each student with a disability must have a teacher of record identified.

The teacher of record must be appropriately <u>licensed</u> to work with the student or, where appropriate state licensure is not available, appropriately trained.

TOR Responsibilities (511 IAC 7-32-97)

- (1) Provide direct or indirect services to the student according to the student's IEP.
- (2) Participate in the CCC meeting as the student's teacher to assist in developing measurable goals, benchmarks, and objectives to meet the student's needs.
- (3) Regularly monitor the implementation of the student's IEP and provide progress reports to the student's parent.
- (4) Ensure the student's IEP is accessible to each of the:
 - (1) student's teachers;
 - (2) related services providers; and
 - (3) other services providers; who are responsible for implementation of the IEP.

THE IEP MUST BE IMPLEMENTED AS IT IS WRITTEN.

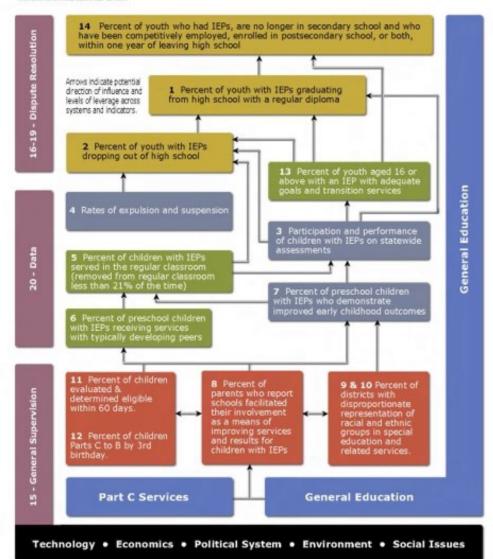

- IEP must confer more than minimal growth
- Endrew F. v. Douglas County School District (March 22, 2017)
- o "To meet it's obligation under IDEA, a school must offer an IEP reasonably calculated to enable the child to make progress appropriate in light of the child's circumstances".
 - Reasonable
 - Progress
 - Appropriate

Free Appropriate Public Education

F=FREE

Students with disabilities are educated at public expense.

A=APPROPRIATE

The student with a disability is entitled to an education that is appropriate for the student's individual needs.

P=PUBLIC

A student with a disability is educated in a public school system. Parents may unilaterally choose to have their child educated in a private school setting or to homeschool their child and are still eligible for special education services.

E=EDUCATION

Education must be provided to an eligible student with a disability.

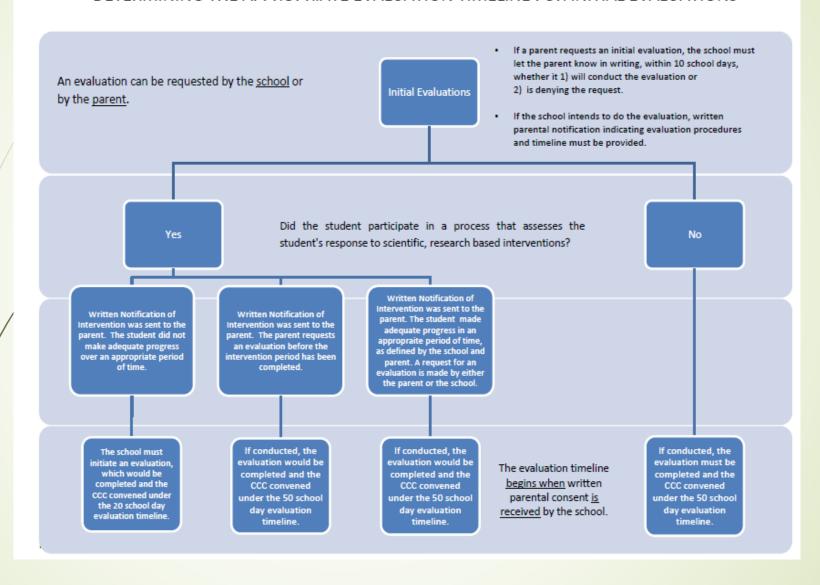

Fax Notification of Request for Educational Evaluation (NOREE) to Joint Services		
the day a parent or school requests a special education evaluation (This includes		
upcoming ACR's when it is anticipated that a re-evaluation will be requested).		
Upon receipt, Joint Services will enter the referral information in the IIEP		
program. Give Notice of Procedural Safeguards to parents.		
Schedule a multidisciplinary meeting (M-team) within 10 days of request. Invite		
the parent and team members involved in the evaluation process to the		
meeting.		
Circulate the <i>Multi-disciplinary Team Data Form</i> to gather data to be reviewed		
at the meeting. The data likely will come from multiple sources and people.		
Data on the Multi-disciplinary Team Data Form is used to complete the pre-		
conference planning tabs in IIEP prior to/at the M-team meeting.		
The IIEP pre-conference planning tabs are updated during the meeting. Either		
the Notice for Evaluation (consent) or Refusal for Evaluation is printed for		
parent. Send signed <i>Consent</i> or <i>Refusal</i> to Joint Services for processing.		
If the M-team is proceeding with a special education evaluation, the IIEP		
program will calculate the due date. During the M-team meeting, members can		
schedule the case conference to discuss evaluation results. Create Notice of		
Case Conference and give or send to parents as soon as the meeting date is set.		
If the M-team is proceeding with a special education evaluation, the family is		
provided with the Social and Developmental History Form and any relevant		
evaluation questionnaires or rating scales.		
Observations and testing are conducted. Vision and Hearing Screening Form is		
completed by nurse and/or SLP. <i>Classroom Observation</i> completed by school		
staff. Systematic observations are completed by Educational Consultant or		
School Psychologist.		
Notice of Initial Findings and Proposed Actions is entered into IIEP for the initial		
case conference by the School Psychologist. This is to be completed and		
provided to parents 5 days prior to an Initial case conference if parent requests,		
indicating an overall description of the evaluations and findings by the school		
psychologist.		
Reports of evaluation results are created, uploaded into IIEP, and team members		
are notified. For initial evaluations, the report is uploaded into IIEP prior to the		
conference.		
Teacher of Record generates a draft IEP for discussion at the case conference		
based on evaluation data and academic and functional present levels from		
teachers and school data. The IEP draft is revised during the case conference.		
IEP is finalized at the conference. If not, it is received by parent by the 10 th		
business day following the conference. Send a final IEP to Joint Services for the		
student's permanent special education file.

Independent Evaluation Requests

- Parents may request at public school expense an IEE if they do not agree with the school's evaluation.
- IDEA and Article 7 allows the public school Due Process as a recourse to deny a request.
- The parents must provide the written request to the Director of Special Education.
- Outside evaluation has to include Article 7 criteria and the evaluator meet requirements as a school psychologist.
- A case conference is held to consider the IEE and any recommendations

<u>Procedural</u> <u>Safeguards</u>

A copy of the notice of procedural safeguards shall be given to the parent of a student with a disability one (1) time a school year, except that a copy also must be given to the parent upon:

- (1) initial referral or parental request for evaluation;
- (2) receipt of the first filing of a complaint under 511 IAC 7-45-1 in a school year;
- (3) receipt of the first due process hearing request under 511 IAC 7-45-3 in a school year;
- (4) the date the public agency decides to make a removal that results in a disciplinary change of placement under 511 IAC 7-44-2, which includes removals to interim alternative education settings for:
 - (A) weapons;
 - (B) drugs; and
 - (C) serious bodily injury;

under 511 IAC 7-44-6; and

(5) request by a parent.

Case Conference Committee Meeting

- Case Conference Committee (CCC) is the group of persons described in Article 7, including the parents and public agency personnel who are responsible for:
 - Reviewing the educational evaluation to determine eligibility
 - Develop, review or revise IEP (including transition IEP)
 - o Determining:
 - Appropriate special education and related service
 - Other matters related to the provision of FAPE.
 - Parent signature required for initial placement and implementation of services.
 - Every 60 instructional days when on homebound or in an out-of-school location

Required Participants

- The Public Agency Representative (PAR)
- Teacher of Record
- General Educator (not fewer than one of the student's teachers)
- Parent
- Instructional Strategist/Multi-Disciplinary Team Member
- Student (age 14+ or beginning their ninth-grade year)

Scheduling

- Meeting date and time is mutually agreed upon
- Must have adequate notice
- <u>All</u> required participants are notified via the CCC notification form.
- Student may attend any CCC Meeting if parent chooses.
- Student must attend if Transition (age 14 +) is being discussed. (if parent does not wish student to attend, document and make sure the student is on the notice of CC to invite document and has provided transition information)
- o IEP must be completed and provided at the completion of the CC. If not, it is received within 10 business days after the date of the CC.
- FINALIZE EVERY IEP.

When To Convene

- Annually from the date of the last conference
- Move-In (within 10 instructional days)
- Disciplinary Change of Placement
- Re-Evaluation Review
- Parent or school Request
- Revisions to the IEP
- 60 instructional days when homebound or an out-of-school location

IEP Required Components

- Student Strengths
- Present Levels of performance
 - Data and progress on goals
- Accommodations
 - Instructional and State Assessment use
- Annual Goals
 - o Observable, Measurable, Skill based
- Progress Monitoring
 - Data on progress toward goals
- Provisions/Services
 - o Direct, indirect, or related
- Least Restrictive Environment
 - With same-aged, typical peers to the extent appropriate
- Progress Reporting
 - Same schedule as typical peers (report cards)
- Other Considerations
- Written Notes
 - Document discussions and agreements

IEP Best Practice

- Know your timelines.
- Send home the Notice of Case Conference prior to the conference.
- Be prepared with a DRAFT IEP for the case conference.
- Finalize every IEP.
- Written consent is required for the initial IEP for special education services.
- Ensure general education teachers and staff
 who work with the student are provided with a
 copy of the accommodations and behavior
 plan.
- Describe the impact of the disability to staff who work with the student.
- Document, Document, Document.
- Progress monitoring on goals must be collected per the IEP goal statement.
- Progress reports are provided as often as nondisabled peers receive reports on progress such as report cards.

Present Levels of Performance

- Talk with the student to obtain their view of their own progress in the last year.
- If appropriate, complete Transition
 Assessments for developing postsecondary goals. Report on the transition activities the student completed.
- Contact all Teachers of Service with specific questions about the student and progress on their IEP goals.
- Collect evidence of student progress (or lack of progress) towards IEP goals and the content the student is learning.
- Request current and accurate records from teachers.
- Gather most recent progress on goals data.
- Gather most recent formal assessment data.
- Solicit Parent and Student input on progress, strengths, and concerns.
- Gather relevant medical information.
- This information becomes evidence of the student's current skills (Present Levels of Academic Achievement and Functional Performance).

Data Sources

- Psycho-educational reports
- Outside evaluations
- Performance on State Assessments
 - Skill deficit areas
- School wide screeners and benchmark assessments
 - Baseline data on skill deficit
 - o Compare progress to school identified normative data.
- State standards to identify key skills
- Progress data on current goals

Accommodations

Accommodations

An accommodation is a support or service that is provided to help a student fully access the general education curriculum. Accommodations provided during classroom instruction and assessments must also be provided during state assessments, if permitted.

Modifications

Modifications are changes to course content, required work, or instructional level. They change the learning goal for an individual student and are used when the general curriculum is too advanced for a student. Modifications usually involve changing an assignment or objective.

ILEARN Read Aloud Accommodation

- DOE guidance document to make determinations for read aloud
- For students in grades 3-8 ELA
- The Read Aloud accommodation for Students with Disabilities is an accommodation available for the ELA portion of ILEARN that is to be identified by a student's CCC in advance of testing.
- It is an accommodation that is appropriate for a relatively small number of students in order to meet their particular needs.
- The Indiana Department of Education will monitor frequency of use for the purpose of carefully monitoring and determining appropriate decision making.

Progress Monitoring

- 511 IAC 7-32-76 "Progress monitoring" defined: a systematic procedure for the frequent and repeated collection and analysis of student performance data.
- Academic or functional performance, or both academic and functional performance, is monitored over time to evaluate the effectiveness of instruction and interventions.
- Regular data collection on goals

Functional Behavior Assessment

- Functional behavioral assessment is a process that uses data to identify patterns in the student's behavior and the purpose or function of the behavior for the student.
- A functional behavioral assessment may require written parental consent.
- Parental consent is not required when a functional behavioral assessment reviews existing data regarding a student.



FBA: Questions to Consider

- What is the history of the behavior?
- Under what conditions does the student do well?
- What are areas of strength?
- What curriculum is being used to teach the student?
- How is the majority of the student's day spent?
- Are there specific times/settings where the behavior is more likely to occur?
- Does the behavior serve a purpose?
- What is the student's method of communication?
- Does the student have a medical problem? Take medication? Difficulty sleeping/eating?
- Are there conditions at home that may be impacting the educational environment?

Behavior Intervention Plan

- Behavior Intervention Plan is a plan agreed upon by the CCC and incorporated into a student's IEP that describes the following:
 - The pattern of behavior that impedes the student's learning or the learning of others.
 - The purpose or function of the behavior.
 - The <u>positive interventions and</u> <u>supports, and other strategies</u> to:
 - Address the behavior
 - Maximize consistency of implementation
 - Skills to be taught to modify the pattern of behavior.



Transition IEP Components: Indicator 13

- A statement of the student's present levels of academic achievement and functional performance.
- Appropriate, measurable postsecondary goals, based upon ageappropriate transition assessments.
- Documentation regarding whether the student will pursue a high school diploma or certificate of completion.
- ☐ Transition services needed to assist the student in reaching post-secondary goals. (Including the individuals and agencies identified for implementing the transition services. Persons responsible must include an adult such as TOR or TOS and parent.)

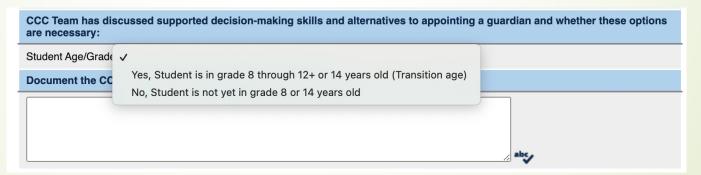

Transition IEP

- Documentation that the CCC reviewed information and the public agency presented the information to the parent and student regarding available adult services.
- A statement of measurable, annual goals including academic and functional, designed to support the post-secondary goals.
- A description of the student's progress toward meeting those post-secondary annual goals.
- Courses of study to achieve post-secondary goals.
- 1 year prior to turning 18 discussion of transfer of rights.
- Supported Decision Making

<u>Supported Decision Making</u>

- The CCC in grades 8-12 must address decision-making skills every year until exit
- At 18, there is a natural transfer of rights.
- Some students continue to need support and there are various levels they can choose.

Alternative Assessment Criteria I AM

- IDOE Participation <u>Guidance</u> and <u>Flowchart</u>
- Review of student records indicates a disability that significantly impacts intellectual functioning and adaptive behavior. Adaptive behavior is defined as essential for someone to live independently and to function safely in daily life.
- The student requires extensive, repeated, individualized instruction and support that is not of a temporary nature.
- The student uses substantially adapted materials and individualized methods of accessing information in alternative ways to acquire, maintain, generalize, demonstrate and transfer skills across multiple settings.
- Goals listed in the IEP for this student are linked to the enrolled grade level Alternative Achievement Standards (Indiana Content Connectors).
- No Mode of Communication guidance
- 1% of the total corporation population.

Alternate Diploma

- In May 2021, the Indiana State Board of Education approved a proposed rule amendment for 511 IAC 6-7.1 (Graduation Requirements) to establish an Alternate
- The Alternate Diploma is standards-based and will be available to students with
 - significant cognitive disabilities
 - that are participating in the alternate assessments and
 - satisfy graduation requirements.
- The first students able to take advantage of the Alternate Diploma will be the 2022-2023 cohort (Class of 2023).

Least Restrictive Environment LRE 511 IAC 7-42-10

IEP TA Information

- LRE placement is determined after eligibility, present levels of performance, accommodations, and goals.
- General education with supplementary aides and services should always be the first option at the CC.
- LRE must be based on the student need, not school convenience.
- Some students will need more support in school and may need a resource room, self-contained class, or other placements based on the need and CC decisions.

Assistive Technology Device

- Must be considered at each meeting where the IEP is being addressed.
- Assistive technology device –
 defined as any item, piece of
 equipment, or product system,
 whether acquired commercially off
 the shelf, modified, or customized,
 that is used to increase, maintain, or
 improve the functional capabilities of
 a student with a disability.
 - o The term does not include a medical device that is surgically implanted or the replacement of such devices.

Assistive Technology Service

- Assistive technology service is any service that directly assists a student with a disability in the selection, acquisition, or use of an assistive technology device.
- The term includes, but is not limited to the following
 - Evaluation of needs
 - Purchasing, leasing, providing AT devices
 - Selecting, fitting, customizing, adapting AT devices
 - Coordinating and using AT with other therapies, interventions or services
 - Training/technical assistance to
 - Student
 - Professionals

ICLP

- E-learning/other Closures and services
- State what services will look like during a closure (weather, quarantine, class/school closure, scheduled PD).
- How will services be provided, how are goals addressed and progress monitored, how accommodations are provided, and how accessibility is addressed?
- DOE Guidance Document

eLearning

- Continue to have a statement In the IEP
- o IDOE Example:
 - "[corporation name] is participating in the eLearning day program which may be utilized on a day when school is cancelled, as a planned day, or as a makeup day when a day of school was missed. In these instances, work may be modified to meet IEP goals. Instruction will be provided to [student name] through_____."
- Options such as online materials, paper and pencil assignments, projects.
- Additional Descriptor box of IIEP;
- "The Dept. of Education has approved eLearning days for this school corporation. During school hours classroom teacher and the teacher of record will be available via email or previously approved method to address student work and goals".

eLearning Tips

- What are the corporation expectations for all teachers?
- Did you utilize your curriculum map?
- What online resources can students access remotely (ULS, MobyMax, N2Y, Attainment, Apps, etc).?
- Did you establish check-in times or office hours?
- o Did you explain eLearning days to your students?
- Did you plan for non-English speaking parents?
- Did you consider accessibility needs?
- Did you consider families without Wi-Fi?
- Did you communicate to parents what the expectations and availability will be (prior to eLearning days)?
- Did you consider lessons/activities for multiple and/or severe disabilities?

Progress Reports

- Provided to parents at least as often as parents are informed of grades
- Reported information needs to match the measurable goal criteria
- Report qualitative (narrative) and quantitative (data) measures.
- This is the collection of data on goal progress

Extended School Year (ESY) 511 IAC 7-42-6(8)

- Services are provided to a child with a disability
 - Beyond the normal school year,
 - In accordance with the child's IEP; and
 - At no cost to the parent of the child.
- Documented factors to determine need
 - Critical learning needs
 - Degree of progress on IEP goals
 - Emerging needs and/or breakthrough learning opportunity
 - Regression and recoupment
 - Interfering behavior
 - Severity of disability
- DOE Guidance Document

Indicator 8 Parent <u>Survey</u>

- Survey of parent satisfaction with the IEP process
- Experience with the planning and implementation of their child's IEP
- Advise them of the short survey
- Annual requirement for completion (ACR)
- Allow parent to complete the survey after the conference
- Send the <u>link</u> via email after the meeting

Medicaid

- Students who receive SLP services, OT or PT services.
- Consent to bill Medicaid uploaded in IIEP
- Parents must sign document one time within the corporation.
- The document acknowledges that parents have been informed of Medicaid billing opportunities.
- The document must be signed and DATED to be eligible for monetary reimbursement.
- A parent's private Medicaid eligibility will NOT be affected.
- A parent may refuse to consent.
- Parent Flyer

Disciplinary Removals

511 IAC 7-44-1

- The school is not required to provide services to a student with a disability during the first 10 cumulative days of removal during a school year.
- Removal for any part of the instructional day constitutes one day of removal.
- In-school suspension is not considered a removal if special education support and services are provided.
- o If bus transportation is part of the student's IEP, removal from the bus would be a removal unless the school provided alternative transportation.

Disciplinary Change of Placement

511 IAC 7-44-2

- A removal or series of removals from a student's current educational placement occurs when:
 - The removal is for more than 10 cumulative days in a school year.
 - o The student is subjected to a series of removals that constitute a pattern because:
 - The series of removals accumulate to more than ten school days per year.
 - The student's behavior is similar to behavior resulting in prior removals.
 - o Length, cumulative amount of time, and proximity of the removals to one another.

Manifestation Determinations

511 IAC 7-44-5

- Must be held within 10 days of any decision to change placement for a violation of behavior policy.
- Need to determine if the behavior was a manifestation of the student's disability.
 - Does the behavior have a direct and substantial relationship to the disability?
 - Was the conduct a result of the failure to implement the IEP as written?
- If a manifestation, the student returns to current placement and the CCC determines revisions to the IEP to meet the student's needs.
- o If not a manifestation, CCC determines services to allow the student to make progress toward goals?

Seclusion or Physical Restraint

- Procedures approved by the BCNWH Governing Board 02/06/08
- Follow procedures for annual requirement
- July 1, 2014: All corporations must have a plan available to students and parents for all students not just special education
- o Parents must be informed.
- Must be written in the IEP when seclusion time-out or physical restraints might be used.
- Documentation of seclusion time-out and physical restraint are maintained.
- Training for staff: Crisis Prevention Intervention Training (CPI).
- Should not be engaging in seclusion or restraint without the CPI training through Jt. Services.

Nonpublic Schools or Homeschooled

511 IAC Rule 34

- All students who are determined eligible for special education and related services have the right to be offered a free appropriate public education from the school corporation of legal settlement.
- o If the nonpublic school is outside the school corporation of legal settlement, the local school (where the nonpublic school is located) will provide special education services.
 - Parent rejects FAPE
 - Service plan developed (SP)
- o TORs with homeschooled students on their caseload must contact parent annually to revise the SP or ensure parent is aware of options.
- Contact Joint Services for support with the service plan process and determination of services.

Revocation of Consent

- After the initial parent consent for the provision of special education services, a parent may revoke that consent if the student is less than 18 years of age.
- Document in IIEP in Documents tab.
- The request must be made in writing to school personnel.
- The school must provide parent with a copy of parent rights and explain the consequences for revocation of consent.

Revocation of Consent

- Once the parent has parent rights and provided an explanation of consequences, all special education services stop.
- The parent may not request partial revocation of consent.
- o The school is obligated to determine if the student is eligible for services under Section 504.
- o If parent wants to seek special education services at a later date, an initial evaluation process is initiated.

Parent Recourse

<u>Complaint</u>: a claim that a school has not implemented federal or state special education rules or has failed to comply with an order issued by an independent hearing officer.

<u>Mediation</u>: a voluntary process in which the parent and school attempt, with the assistance of trained impartial mediator, to resolve a dispute.

Due process hearing: a claim concerning the identification or eligibility of a student for special education services; the appropriateness of the educational evaluation or the student's proposed or current level of special education services or placement; or any other dispute involving the provision of a free appropriate public education.

WHAT IS JOINT SERVICES?

Joint Services FAQ

What goes where?

- SCAN/email or FAX to Joint Services
 - Notice of Request for an Educational Evaluation (NOREE) after a school or parent request for an evaluation.
 - Any <u>parent consent</u> for evaluation the day it is received. These are time sensitive and must be received as soon as possible so staff involved are notified quickly. Consent for evaluations will be EasyFaxed <u>after</u> the request is processed at Joint Services.
 - New Student Move-In Forms can be emailed or faxed to Mara Williams to check IIEP, request a file transfer, and assign TOR.
- All IEPs (i.e., move in, ACR, revise, re-eval review, etc.), reports, Change of Enrollment Status forms, or any other information related to a student's file that is not time sensitive are sent to Joint Services. These documents can be sent with the Educational Consultant assigned to your building emailed or faxed. These documents are used for caseload lists and data management and submission.
- Easy FAX or Smart Scan to PCG/IIEP <u>parent</u> <u>signatures</u> provided on a final IEP. **Do not** <u>upload/Easy Fax an unsigned form.</u> The signature page will upload into the IIEP file for the student.

Move-In Students

- Scan/Email or Fax the <u>New Student Move-In</u> Form to Joint Services. It is located on the Joint Services website (https://www.booneclintonjs.org/).
- Be sure the student is enrolled and entered in the student data management system (Harmony, Power School, Skyward).
- A record transfer will occur in IIEP between the sending LEA and Joint Services (if the sending school uses IIEP and the student is transferring within Indiana).
- You will be granted access as the TOR to the IEP in IIEP by Mara or the Educational Consultant.
- Schedule and hold a move-in conference within 10 instructional days of enrollment to create an IEP for the current placement.
- Send a copy of the move-in IEP, the previous IEP, and the current psych report to Joint Services.

Withdrawal or Dismissal from Special Education

Complete the <u>Change of Enrollment</u>
<u>Status</u> form and fax/send to Joint Services.

FINAL REMINDERS

- The IEP must be implemented as written by everyone.
 - If there are issues, convene the CCC to discuss.
- If a student is not making progress or has achieved goals, convene to update the IEP.
- Any change in provisions, services, accommodations need to be in the current IEP.
- Collect data on goals and behavior plans.
- Final IEPs are received by parents 10 BUSINESS days after a CCC (this includes school breaks).
- If there is a concern about eligibility, consider a reevaluation.
 - Excessive absences, hospitalizations, change in needs
- For HS students, written notice of progress toward diploma is required. Send to parent and upload in IIEP.
- All IEPs are sent to Joint Services ACR, move-in, revise, MD, etc.
